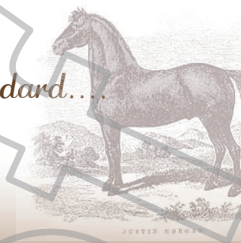




...raising the Lippitt standard...

Lippitts are a bloodline within the Morgan Horse Breed. They are special because they display all the attributes of the original Morgans—they are the living embodiment of Morgans from the mid 1800's. Most Lippitt pedigrees go back over 220 years in as few as 14 generations. They are considered by many as the “foundation bloodline” of the Morgan breed. “To touch a Lippitt is to touch history.”

What is it that sets the Lippitt apart from all other Morgan horses? Is it his physical attributes, his pedigree, presence...that special aura that seems to exude from his very being? The answer is all of these and more!

The Morgan horse is unique in that it descends from only one stallion, named Justin Morgan, after his owner by the same name. Originally called Figure, he was born in Massachusetts and later taken to Vermont. Today's Foundation Morgan is to be found all over the country, working cattle out west, in the Sport Horse area of competition, in the family back yard, out on the trail, and competing in Driving competitions where they are still considered the Cadillac of driving horses.

The foundation stallion at MorMac Acres is Schiehallion Nicholas. His pedigree is a balanced combination of all the main Lippitt lines. This shows in his conformation and temperament, as well as his abilities. His conformation is adaptable to compete in any discipline or just be at home as a sport horse. Nicholas has sired three fillies which are doing quite well with their owners, and a full Lippitt colt, Olympus. Nicholas has two expected foals in 2018. The mares at the farm currently consist of two full Lippitts and two half Lippitts. Nicholas will be standing at stud to a limited number of select mares.

Valamar Primrose, who is making an appearance on the Lippitt Club breed row and Equus Survival booth at 2017 Equine Affaire, is by definition a small in stature but large in Morgan typiness with a well-balanced conformation. She has dense bones and is a stocky mare. Her beautiful temperament matches her good-looking head. Rosie is from Valamar farm in Georgia, and has two fillies registered in Canada. She also produced an almost perfectly balanced and very spirited full Lippitt colt soon after her return to the United States (Olympus).

The beauty of the Morgan horse lifts the heart. The breed exists solely because they please people. It's their heritage. The Morgan horse is free moving and calm under western tack or elegant and aristocratic when ridden in English style. A tractable temperament allows the Morgan to excel when driving in single or multiple hitches. Reliable, loyal, tireless, and versatile, a Morgan becomes one with people with of all ages and walks of life and shares the mutual enjoyment in every equine pastime. The Morgan is known for his great qualities: intelligence, willingness, thriftiness and good sense. But beyond all those things, the Morgan is known for his charisma and companionableness.
